Coed Pendugwm Feb-14



27th October 2012 saw dormice confirmed as present at Coed Pendugwm for the first time in 9 years.

100 new dormouse boxes had been erected in the March of that year, but had remained unused until then.

Since their rediscovery, we are happy to report that dormice have continued to use the boxes, which are checked monthly between April and November.

In fact, in summer 2013, one female was found in the same box in four successive months, successfully raising three youngsters.

The dormouse survey work is carried out by Voluntary Warden and MWT Conservation Officer, Tammy Stretton. If any

Other monitoring news

Montgomeryshire Wildlife Trust has also erected new bird and bat boxes and an Otter holt, during 2013. The latter, made from recycled plastic, was constructed as the nearby holt, which had been constructed from natural materials had succumbed to age!

With support from Natural Resources Wales, we have also undertaken Common Standards Monitoring (CSM) monitoring of the habitat at Pendugwm Woods Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI), of which Coed Pendugwm is a part. We are delighted to report that the SSSI is in 'favourable condition'.



A Breeding Bird Survey was conducted on the reserve in Spring 2013. 21 bird species were recorded, including a single male Wood Warbler singing on the reserve for the first time in many years.

The late snowfall in March 2013 brought a large number of trees down on the reserve. Once again, a significant amount of tree surgery was needed to clear the paths and make them safe.

A small area of Hazel, around the car park was coppiced in December.
